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Personal Reflections from Sam Keighley, VCSE Sector Lead, Health and Care Partnership

As we've known for some time, the Bradford District and Craven Health and Care System is changing. As things continue to evolve, I thought it a good time to share my personal reflections of the changes starting to take place.

The reduction in size of NHS West Yorkshire Integrated Care Board (ICB) has begun, with many ICB colleagues applying for and being approved voluntary redundancy. There are some really good staff leaving. What worries me most about this, as well as the knowledge we are losing, is that many people leaving have been strong advocates for our sector. All will have left by mid-April.

All remaining ICB staff across West Yorkshire will take part in a recruitment process as part of a much smaller organisation, this process will start in April and is expected to end in June. This means that, as well as losing staff we've worked with for a long time, it's also possible that we will see new staff coming into the area who don't know our place or our diverse communities. Of course, bringing in new thinking can be helpful. And there will be lots of relationship building to do in the second half of this year with colleagues new to the area and colleagues who we know but who will be in different roles.

I want you to know that I will continue to remind whoever comes to work in our system, that they have a duty to involve and support our local VCSE.

As part of the ICB changes, some functions that have been delivered locally are transferring to West Yorkshire, and a small number of roles will go to NHS England North East and Yorkshire. The thing most likely to affect us as a sector is the transfer of the commissioning function to West Yorkshire. I will work with you over the next weeks and months to ensure that people understand what makes Bradford District and Craven unique and a place we are proud to serve.

There's a lot of challenge coming. And I believe there is also cause for hope. Like all places, BDC needs to develop a Place Provider Partnership (PPP). I'm working with staff from the VCS Alliance to produce a video presentation to explain the new emerging governance structures, including where the PPP sits within that. That will be available in early March.

Each place needs to develop a PPP in at least shadow form by 1st April this year and all PPP's need to be fully functioning by April 2027. The PPP will be made up of all partners, including our sector. This is a responsibility that I will need your support on as VCSE Sector Lead. Over time the PPP will make the decisions about where resource should be directed to help deliver ambitions set out in the BDC Health Care and Wellbeing Strategy, including tackling health inequalities. It's great that we have a voice at this table. Alongside primary care colleagues and others, it provides the place to challenge for stronger effort designed at bringing services closer to communities delivered by people they trust and delivering prevention activities.

There are two areas for us, as a sector, to focus on so that we can influence and shape our PPP for our place.

Many of you who, like me, are advocating and offering your expertise in different parts of the system came together at Victoria Hall in December when we talked about this. As a result of that, a few of us are now piloting using a simple feedback form which staff at the VCSA will collate on a regular basis. The more of us that do this, the more insight there will be to help us influence the health and care system for West Yorkshire. Like primary care colleagues, we also need to demonstrate more visibly our connectivity as a VCSE sector, including with VCSE organisations working with our most underserved communities. We have some great connectivity already e.g. Mental Health Provider Forum, Young Lives Forum, Race Equality Network, Briefing Bradford, ABDC Partnership delivering the Activation contract and other activity to support the sector, VCSE community anchor organisations working with Community Partnerships, Wellbeing Network partners, to name but a few. Over the next weeks and months, I'll be doing some thinking, hopefully with lots of you, about how we can use our collective connectivity to gain and share knowledge that supports us all and brings further benefits to our communities right across Bradford District and Craven.

It is important for me to stress once again these are my personal reflections and we expect formal communications to be shared in due course around the PPPs. There is work for us to do as a sector, before 1 April 2027 so that the VCSE continues to be seen as an equal partner in our PPP. I will, as always, continue to do what I can, and I will also need your support.

Challenging the Silence: Male Survivor Needs Seminar Series

[Survivors West Yorkshire \(SWY\)](#) is delivering a series of five in-person seminars across West Yorkshire, visiting each of the five local authority areas. Each event brings together the latest research evidence, frontline practice insight, and a powerful lived experience exhibition to challenge the silence surrounding childhood sexual abuse and improve access to support, particularly for male survivors.

The seminars showcase [Ben's Place](#), West Yorkshire's only large-scale specialist service for male survivors, alongside research presented by Dr Stacey Maher from the University of Huddersfield. Each event also features Victorious Voices, a survivor-led photography exhibition uniting male and female survivors to demonstrate the strength, solidarity, and allyship that exists across genders in the healing journey.

Following the overwhelmingly positive reception at the inaugural Leeds event, the series now moves to Bradford.

Gambling Related Harms Course

Millions of people across the UK are affected by gambling-related harms, yet many who would benefit from treatment or support are not accessing it, often because they are unaware it exists. Estimates from the [Office of Health Improvement and Disparities \(2023\)](#) suggest that 16,283 adults in the Bradford district are at risk of or experiencing gambling-related harm, alongside an estimated 10,302 children living in the same household as an adult who may be affected.

Bradford Gambling Related Harm (GRH) Group has secured free, two-hour online training sessions designed for frontline professionals, delivered by [Chapter One](#), a charity dedicated to reducing the harm gambling causes to society.

How to Fundraise with CNet:

Magdalen Hospital Trust:

UK-based charities and CIOs working with vulnerable children and young adults, particularly those at risk of exploitation, are encouraged to apply for a grant from the [Magdalen Hospital Trust](#). Project costs are preferred, covering initiatives such as training, clubs and play schemes, safeguarding education, mental health support and emergency care. Grants of £500 to £2,000 are available, with applications accepted three times a year: **1st to 28th February**, 1st to 30th June, and 1st to 31st October 2026. Nisa: Making a Difference Locally:

The [Nisa Making a Difference Locally \(MADL\)](#) charity offers small grants of up to £500 for community-level projects across the UK. Funding is aimed at grassroots initiatives that make a real difference to local life, including activities for children and young people, community events, wellbeing projects, equipment purchases and minor capital items. Funding requests are made directly to local Nisa store owners, who decide which causes in their area to support. Grants are awarded on a rolling basis throughout the year.

The Brelms Trust:

[The Brelms Trust](#) is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO), established in 2007, that awards grants exclusively to charities based in Yorkshire and benefitting Yorkshire communities. Priority is given to organisations working at the heart of communities to tackle disadvantage and deliver sustainable benefit. Applications are welcomed from a wide range of charities and may cover staff salaries, volunteer expenses, running costs, and direct service provision.

Grants range from £1,000 to £6,000 per year and may be awarded as a one-off payment or across up to three consecutive years, with a maximum total award of £18,000. Applicants are expected to demonstrate that wider funding plans are in place, as the Trust does not generally cover the total cost of a project. [Applications are submitted online](#), and the Trust's website provides comprehensive guidance on what to do before applying. Applications are accepted on a rolling basis, with funds awarded quarterly; the next round of awards is due in April 2026.

One Stop Community Partnership:

Local community groups operating within two miles of a [One Stop](#) store are invited to apply for grants of up to £1,000 through the [One Stop Community Partnership](#) programme. Funding is available from **2nd March** to groups tackling food poverty, supporting vulnerable people, the elderly or low-income families, running youth sports teams, or working to reduce waste and improve the environment. Successful applicants will also benefit from a long-term, tailored support programme delivered in partnership with their local One Stop store team, including volunteering, fundraising and awareness-raising to help them grow and improve their services.

The only Bradford store is at Heaton, BD9 4BB.

Henry Smith Foundation:

The [Holiday Grants Programme](#) provides funding of up to £3,000 for schools, youth groups, and non-profit organisations to arrange recreational trips for children aged 13 and under in the UK. It prioritizes disabled children and those experiencing high deprivation. Apply 6 weeks before the planned trip.
