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Bradford District VCSE Sector Speaks to Council Election Candidates:

Following discussions at Area Networks in February, the Bradford District VCSE sector has come together to publish a [joint statement to all candidates standing](#) in the May 2026 local council elections.

Prepared via the Leaders' Network, the statement sets out the scale and reach of the sector across the district and puts four clear asks to prospective councillors, covering everything from implementing a Civil Society Covenant to recognising VCSE organisations as essential partners in delivering council priorities. A follow-up document will be sent to all elected councillors once the elections conclude.

This is a statement we hope every VCSE organisation will get behind. Many of us live and work in Bradford District, and we are stronger together. Help amplify this by sharing through your own networks and social media. If you're having conversations with candidates over the coming weeks, or even answering the door to one, please share these messages.

Bradford District Voluntary, Community and Social Enterprise (VCSE) sector statement for candidates in the May 2026 local council election

From small groups at the local community centre, right up to district wide mental health, drug and alcohol and welfare advice services, with everything in between, the VCSE sector has an impact in every ward of our District. The VCSE sector is a vital part of the fabric of Bradford District, working alongside our public sector partners, to ensure that the citizens of Bradford District can lead their very best lives.

Our large and vibrant VCSE sector includes 1489 registered Charities, Community Benefit Societies and Social Enterprises rising to over 5000 when we include unregistered charities, community associations, sports clubs and informal groups. VCSE sector turnover of the 699 largest groups in 2024-25 was over £176m and there are almost 16,000 registered volunteers.

We write this statement to those who are standing to be elected as Bradford District councillors to ask them to consider the following actions should they be successfully elected.

1. Implement the Civil Society Covenant:

We consider establishing and delivering against this local framework for government-voluntary sector collaboration as a top priority for the newly formed council.

2. Build on what works:

Build on existing and established initiatives, offering continuity to local communities and residents. Ensure that valuable and effective services are maintained and where changes are required, base them on evidence and benefit to communities. Continue to use the established co-production principles, working with the VCSE sector and local residents to develop services.

3. Listen to Communities Across All of Bradford:

Ensure decisions benefit entire Bradford district, not just central Bradford postcodes. Councillors must think beyond their immediate ward and consider impact on all postcodes. Listen to those doing the work on the ground, not just the loudest voices or those with most influence. Take a Bradford-wide perspective whilst representing local areas.

4. Recognise the VCSE sector as essential partners in delivering council priorities:

Local VCSE sector organisations possess the community connections, trust and expertise needed to translate strategic ambitions into meaningful outcomes for Bradford residents. We bring your vision to reality. No one sector can achieve our District ambitions alone. We need all our best efforts and to work collaboratively to provide joined up services, deliver better outcomes for and with our citizens and make the best use of our resources.

When the newly formed council is announced, we will be back in touch to bring this statement to life, sharing local stories to help you understand the value of the VCSE sector in your area, and how by working together we can improve the lives of local people in Bradford.

West Yorkshire ICB: Employers for Carers Platform

[West Yorkshire Integrated Care Board \(ICB\)](#) holds a two-year umbrella membership, provided by [Carers UK](#), to the Employers for Carers platform. Funded through the [DHSC Accelerating Reform Fund](#), it gives managers, wellbeing teams and carers access to a wide range of digital tools and resources to make the reality of working and caring that little bit easier.

West Yorkshire Local Authorities can share a curated version of this membership with smaller organisations across their area, giving them free, round-the-clock access to [Efc Digital](#). The platform includes e-learning modules to help carers self-identify, an induction module for all staff, and line manager training to help teams understand why supporting carers matters. Carers can also find practical support to strengthen their resilience and look after their own wellbeing alongside that of the person they care for.

Raising Awareness Many employees with caring responsibilities do not think of themselves as carers, which can prevent them from getting the support they need. The platform's induction and e-learning modules help build awareness across the whole workforce and encourage carers to self-identify.

Support for Managers and Carers Line manager training covers the benefits of supporting carers, practical strategies for managing employees with caring responsibilities and guidance on flexible working. Carers, meanwhile, can access wellbeing resources, resilience advice and information on workplace policies and external support networks.

Embedding Carer-Friendly Policies The platform encourages employers to introduce flexible working options, establish staff networks for carers, and create space for open conversations about caring responsibilities during regular check-ins and reviews.

A Guide to Grants and Funding: A Free Evening in Keighley

Organisations in Keighley are invited to a free evening of grants and funding advice on **29 April, from 5pm to 6.30pm** at the [Downstairs Project \(Civic Centre\)](#).

The evening will include a talk from [Community Action Bradford & District](#)'s very own Chris Barker on funding and grants, highlights from previous Keighley Town Council-funded projects, and informal advice on the external grants and Keighley Town Council funding available to local organisations.

It is a drop-in event, so attendees can come along when they can, and there will be free food and refreshments on the night.

Whether organisations are just starting to explore funding options or already have a project in mind, this is a brilliant chance to get the information and advice needed in a friendly, relaxed setting.

Reduced-Cost Defibrillators Available Across the UK

[London Hearts](#) is a registered charity supplying life-saving defibrillators across the UK and currently has a funded scheme offering the Mindray C1A Defibrillator with a range of mounting and storage options to suit different locations, from as little as £660 (*excluding VAT*).

Demand is high and funding is limited, so early action is advised. Eligibility requirements are straightforward and the scheme is open to all UK-based organisations. Visit [London Hearts website](#) for details and to [apply](#).

Barclays Community Sport Fund

The [Barclays Community Sport Fund](#), supports grassroots sports organisations in the UK's most deprived areas. Focused on football, tennis and cricket, it aims to make sport more accessible to women and girls, people with disabilities, racially diverse communities and LGBTQ+ individuals. Eligible community groups can apply for a **£1,000 grant** before the **27 May deadline**.

Schroder Charity Trust

With over 70 years of supporting the UK charity sector, the [Schroder Charity Trust](#) offers **grants of up to £5,000 (deadline 30 April)** across two objectives: enabling children and young adults from disadvantaged backgrounds to thrive in education and employment, and strengthening communities through services that improve outcomes for vulnerable people. Caremark: Community Care Fund

The [Caremark Community Care Fund](#) offers **three grants of £3,000 each** to community projects across the UK that bring people together and make a lasting difference. Projects could include equipment for inclusive sports groups, revamping a community centre, supplies for a community garden or support for food banks and pre-schools. Shortlisted projects go to a public vote on social media, with the three most-voted projects winning the grant. **The deadline for nominations is 31 May 2026.**

The Environment Partnership

Now in its seventh year, [The Environment Partnership's Environment Grant](#) offers funding **between £250 and £1,000** to individuals, groups, students, institutions and charities across the UK. Having supported multiple projects over the past six years, the grant backs initiatives that raise awareness of environmental issues, support environmental learning or further the environmental profession. If your project has the potential to make a real impact on the wider environment, this could be the fund for you. **Deadline to apply is 31 May.**

Efficiency North: EN:Communities Community Foundation Fund

The [Community Foundation Fund](#) supports community-led projects that make a real difference to people's lives. The fund has a total pot of £250,000 to give to charities and groups in **grants of up to £5,000** to buy equipment and items. Projects with greater need and larger impact may be eligible for higher levels of funding. The fund supports projects that tackle financial hardship, improve access to essential services and create opportunities for those facing economic disadvantage, as well as initiatives that promote physical and mental wellbeing, encourage active lifestyles and improve access to health-focused facilities and resources. The [deadline to apply](#) is **1 June.**

Joanies Fund

The [Joanies Fund](#) supports community projects working solely with young people aged 0 to 25 across England and Wales. The fund has a particular interest in innovative or entrepreneurial projects that lead to employment, accreditation and further education or training. Projects must be open to all young people regardless of ethnicity or religion and demonstrate strong integration into their local communities.

The average grant award in 2024-25 was £2,570. Do not wait too long to apply: the current round opened on 13 April and will close on 31 July, or earlier if the fund becomes oversubscribed.

Mission Critical: What Next for Engaging Communities in the Clean Energy Transition?

Hitting clean power targets by 2030 is as much a social challenge as a technical one. This **free webinar** on **29 April, 11am to 12pm** explores how national energy policy can translate into genuine local participation, covering community communication, the economic case for getting engagement right and how to overcome the key threats to net zero. Research and Evidence: Learning and Development at HDRC Bradford

A key part of the Health Determinants Research Collaboration (HDRC) Bradford's work is to support stakeholders in understanding and using research and evidence in their everyday council work. The aim is to embed this in a sustainable way, so that it becomes the natural way of working and everyone feels confident asking: *what does the evidence say about this?*

To achieve this, HDRC Bradford has developed a learning and development approach designed to build and apply these skills both personally and professionally. This includes a wide-ranging training programme enabling staff to understand and engage with research and evidence, as well as a Community of Research to support all those with an interest in the field. External academics and experts are also brought in to contribute their knowledge, while staff and stakeholders are supported in developing their research interests, skills and knowledge, helping to raise the profile of research within the Council. There are also regular opportunities to showcase the work of council staff and stakeholders, alongside networking and collaboration opportunities.

Become a Community Champion for Vaccination

Applications are now open for Community Champions who would like to complete a [Level 2 Qualification in Encouraging Vaccination Uptake](#). This qualification equips participants with the confidence, knowledge and practical skills needed to support conversations about vaccines and help people make informed choices about their health and wellbeing. It is ideal for anyone who works with, supports or represents their local community and wants to make a positive difference. **The eight-hour course includes a face-to-face session in May.**

As a Champion, you will share clear and trusted vaccination messages with communities who may be less heard, drawing on the knowledge and relationships of local community groups to make vaccination information more relevant and accessible. You will also create opportunities for conversations in settings that people trust, helping to address barriers and build confidence in communities most affected by health inequalities. The course will cover:

- What vaccines do and how they help keep communities healthy.
- Why some people and communities have concerns about vaccines, including the impact of myths and misinformation.
- How beliefs, culture and attitudes can influence decisions about vaccination.
- Simple communication techniques to encourage vaccination uptake and direct people to trusted sources of information.

Spring COVID-19 Vaccinations

The NHS has launched its [Spring 2026 COVID-19 vaccination programme](#) across West Yorkshire, encouraging those most at risk to come forward.

Eligible groups include adults aged 75 and over, residents in care homes for older adults, and those aged 6 months and over with a weakened immune system. Protection from previous vaccinations can fade over time, making the booster particularly important for these groups. .

Appointments are available at GP practices, community pharmacies and walk-in sites **until 30 June 2026**. No invitation is needed to book. Eligible people can do so via the NHS App, [online](#), by calling 119 for free (with translators available), or by visiting [a walk-in COVID-19 vaccination site](#).
